

Resolve Implementation Bottlenecks

Co-ordinate an early warning system that **identifies bottlenecks** both proactively and reactively and implement a rapid response mechanism to support countries to overcome these implementation bottlenecks

Resource Mobilisation

Co-ordinate and provide technical assistance and implementation support for comprehensive financial gap analyses, development of funding proposals and investment requests, fostering country coalitions, and coordinating engagement with donors at all levels to address bottlenecks and gaps

- Identifying flexibility within existing sources of funding Innovating financing including End Malaria Funds

Major achievements in 2022

- The CRSPC provides a platform to engage the RBM community in coordinating implementation support to countries and subregional entities as they execute their malaria control and elimination programmes.
- At both country and regional (e.i E8;SaME; ECCAS) levels, supports were provided through the three partnership committee mechanisms
- The support included technical assistance for planning and implementation bottlenecks resolution (ITN, SMC, HBHI; CRG-Malaria Match Box evaluation; "Zero Malaria Starts with me"etc).
- Support for MPRs/ MTRs and NSP development and/or adjustment were also provided in collaboration and under le leadership of WHO. This includes prioritization and subnational tailoring of interventions for better impact.

Support countries in the design of quality, prioritized programmes at country and regional levels

Support the design of quality, prioritized programmes at the country level

- CRSPC in collaboration with WHO, has provided support to 3 countries and 4 regions in developing malaria strategic plans and in conducting MPRs with 3 more countries and 2 regions in process
- CRSPC is supporting 3 countries in the Malaria Matchbox implementation to identify and address barriers in CRG
- Support has switched from virtual to in-person support at the request of countries
- Align malaria planning with the broader health and development agenda, and support to resource mobilization.
- Opportunity to incorporate a mix of new tools and best practices, including strategy to ensure access to everyone.
- Enable countries to design policies, set new targets and improve their coordination systems, including incorporation of CRG programming

Building regional capacity in Africa and Southeast Asia

- Regional bodies: EAC (GLMI), SADC and E8, SaME, and SEA were supported in the development of the Malaria Strategic plans, coordination activities, and others
- Recruited focal points in EAC, SADC and WAHO to enhance regional capacity
- Align malaria planning with the broader health and development agenda, and support to resource mobilization.
- Mainstream malaria in the agenda of the regional economic communities including at Head of State, minister and technical level


Facilitate timely access to implementation support to address bottlenecks and gaps

Implementation support to address bottlenecks and gaps

- 23 implementation supports provided /ongoing to countries and regions through international and local consultants in 2022
- These include planning ITN, IRS campaigns in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic and working to support continuity of care by addressing resource gaps and commodity stock outs etc
- Other support included development of communication and behaviour change strategies, launch and implementation of Zero Malaria Starts with Me campaigns, Retrospective assessment of the malaria programme, surveillance etc

The Impact of the TAs

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Major achievements in 2022 continued

Malaria Programs and Partners meeting for Central, Eastern, Southern and Western Africa SRNs were organized to:

- Provide opportunity for the countries to share best practices, challenges in mitigating the impact of COVID-19 on malaria intervention
- Inform countries on the current malaria prevention control tools, perspectives to better plan and implement – updates from WHO and other partners
- Facilitate the process of planning TA needs
- Provide heads up on GF implementation, GF GC7 application process, gap analysis updates, updates on Global, regional and continental initiatives.

Strategic Objective 2: Maximise levels of financing

Supporting the Global Fund Replenishment Campaign:

- Amplifying the Global Fund investment case Malaria-specific case studies, thematic
 narratives and advocacy arguments demonstrating impact of Global Fund investments have been
 developed for use by RBM Partners
- Leveraging key moments to increase support for the Global Fund
 - World Malaria Day high-level event and Partner messaging
 - World Malaria Day Francophone event with OIF, WHO, GF, Africa CDC
 - o CHOGM 2022 Kigali Summit on Malaria and NTDs thought leadership
- Elevating malaria and CSO voices throughout campaign
 - Contributing malaria messaging and champions to three disease community advocacy efforts
 - Participating in cross-community Partner roundtables
- Francophonie engagement
 - World Malaria Day Francophone event with key partners

Support Countries to fill financial gaps:

 Provide TA to countries and regional entities in financial and programmatic gap analysis - 95% of highly and moderately endemic countries mobilised sufficient resources to cover their LLIN, IRS, SMC and case management gaps in 2022

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Major achievements in 2022

Orientation meeting on The Global Fund GC7 application process to:

- Provide detailed information on the Global Fund differentiated application processes;
- Provide an overview of WHO technical recommendations for malaria;
- Support countries to develop their application development plans and timelines
- Review RBM Partnership to end malaria support tools including the programmatic and financial gap analysis template to be used to support the submission; and
- Compile, review and plan the technical support needed through RBM/CRSPC.

Priorities for the next months

- Support countries in GF Funding Request in 2023
 - To ensure timely submission of high quality funding proposals and to avoid gaps in implementation, the CRSPC will provide a comprehensive package of support to countries, based on a tried and tested country-led approach
 - International consultants provide TA to support the development of the funding applications and background documents such as gap analysis, address TRP comments, MPR/NSP.
 - Funds to countries to support in-country consultations, country dialogue and recruitment of local consultants.
 - Mock TRP meetings will be held to facilitate country peer review of draft applications.
 - Remote expert review of final draft funding applications will be provided by CRSPC members
 - Support is planned to assist countries to achieve timely grant signature (Grant making).



Data Initiative

Data Initiative is one of the strategic enablers of the RBM 2021-2025 strategic framework that:

Fills a GAP existing on data centric global coordination:

- Countries have limited opportunities to bring current challenges to the attention of the global stakeholder ecosystem.
- Malaria Community had little visibility on near real time data on bottlenecks.
- Information available often scattered across many websites requiring advanced IT skills for accessing.

New Dashboards: Weather Forecast

- Adapts the Seasonal Climate Forecasts developed by the International Research Institute for Climate and Society (IRI) translating the complex data into easily understandable maps.
- Forecast products include monthly updates of global maps showing regions of increased probability for being wetter-, dryer-, warmer- or colder-than-normal for the upcoming season (3-4 ahead)
- These data can help countries and partners to increase buffer stocks, or ensure early deployment of commodities to the field or interventions.



Joint probability of temperatures in optimal range and precipitations above 150mm


New Dashboards: Long-term malaria commodities forecasting outputs

- Projections of need and demand for vector control and case management commodities until 2031.
- Projections developed by the Global Malaria Commodities Forecasting Consortium (lead by CHAI), with funding from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.
- Outputs will be updated annually for the duration of the project (until December 2025).
- Long-term forecast projections are modelled based on multiple data inputs, including demographics, epidemiology, coverage of interventions, resistance, trends in domestic and donor funding for malaria commodities.


New Data & Visuals on Interventions Historical Trends
