- Always a **strong interest** on multisectorality from **RBM**.
- Interest from the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (${\sf SDC}$) to finance the coordination of a Working Group with multisectoral focus (2017).
- Request for accreditation prepared by SWISS TPH (receives the SDC-funds).
- Approval by the RBM Board on April 14, 2018 in Dakar, Senegal.
- A new Working Group is born: Multi-Sectoral Working Group
- Interim co-chairs announced:
 - Dr Graham Alabaster (UN-Habitat)
 - Dr Robert Bos (International Water Association)
- Coordinator: Dr Konstantina Boutsika (Swiss TPH)

Leadership

- Dr Maisoon Elbukhari Ibrahim succeeded Dr Robert Bos as interim cochair at the end of 2019. Her term ended at the end of 2020.
- Dr Graham Alabaster remains as co-chair until the end of his term in December 2022.

Consensus for the election of Peter Mbabazi's as MSWG co-chair with immediate effect and end of term in December 2024.
